

Dear Colleagues,

Last year we have had successful event with 610 participants from all over the world. The 80 meters conditions were favourable and majority of participants could enjoy big rates during first hours of contest. We have got more than 330 electronic and paper logs and the statistics shows there were stations from 46 DXCC countries. Let me congratulate the winners of Baltic Contest 2010, holders of special trophies.

For the first time ever we see Darius LY3BN at the top of Baltic Countries in SSB/CW with solid gap from YL2SM. Algis LY7M has won CW medal. Estonian guys are unbeatable in SSB – this year we have Vello ES0QD at the top with Karlis YL2CI with better claimed score behind. Nobody has had chances to resist the WRTC 2010 team Nr. 2 – Tonno ES5TV and Toivo ES2RR have had easy walk as ES5G.

Alexander EV1R was the first in both modes among Europeans with Šarūnas MOUNN (LY4Y) quite close but unreach-

able because of geographical differences. Vladimir RA3EG won victory in CW with just two points ahead of Max RA1AL and he has got two more special trophies, Marek SP5LS has had more Baltic stations in the log and has taken a medal from Jan OZ1ADL in SSB. European team competition was quite modest and the winner was 7S6W. It has become a tradition to see Vladimir R3A-847 in the top of SWL section. We still need more DX stations. Anyway, the medal for DX in MIX mode entry went to Bogdan RU9CD and Nickolay UA9AOL was the best in CW.

It is very pleasant to see the number of participants growing. It exceeds 600 for second year in a row despite new UN contest during BC time.

I would like to thank sponsors of the special trophies, the staff who helps organize this event. And thank you everybody for joining Baltic Contest!

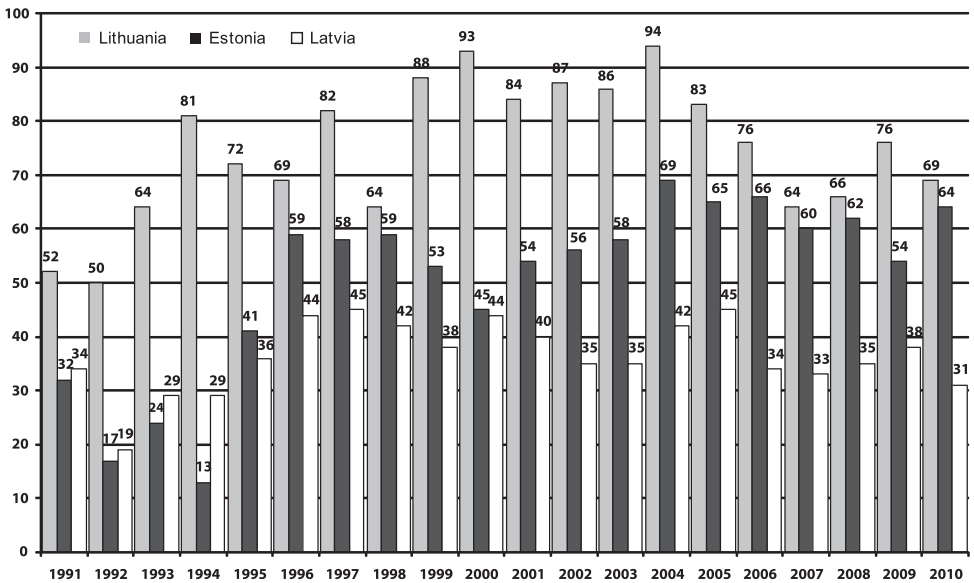

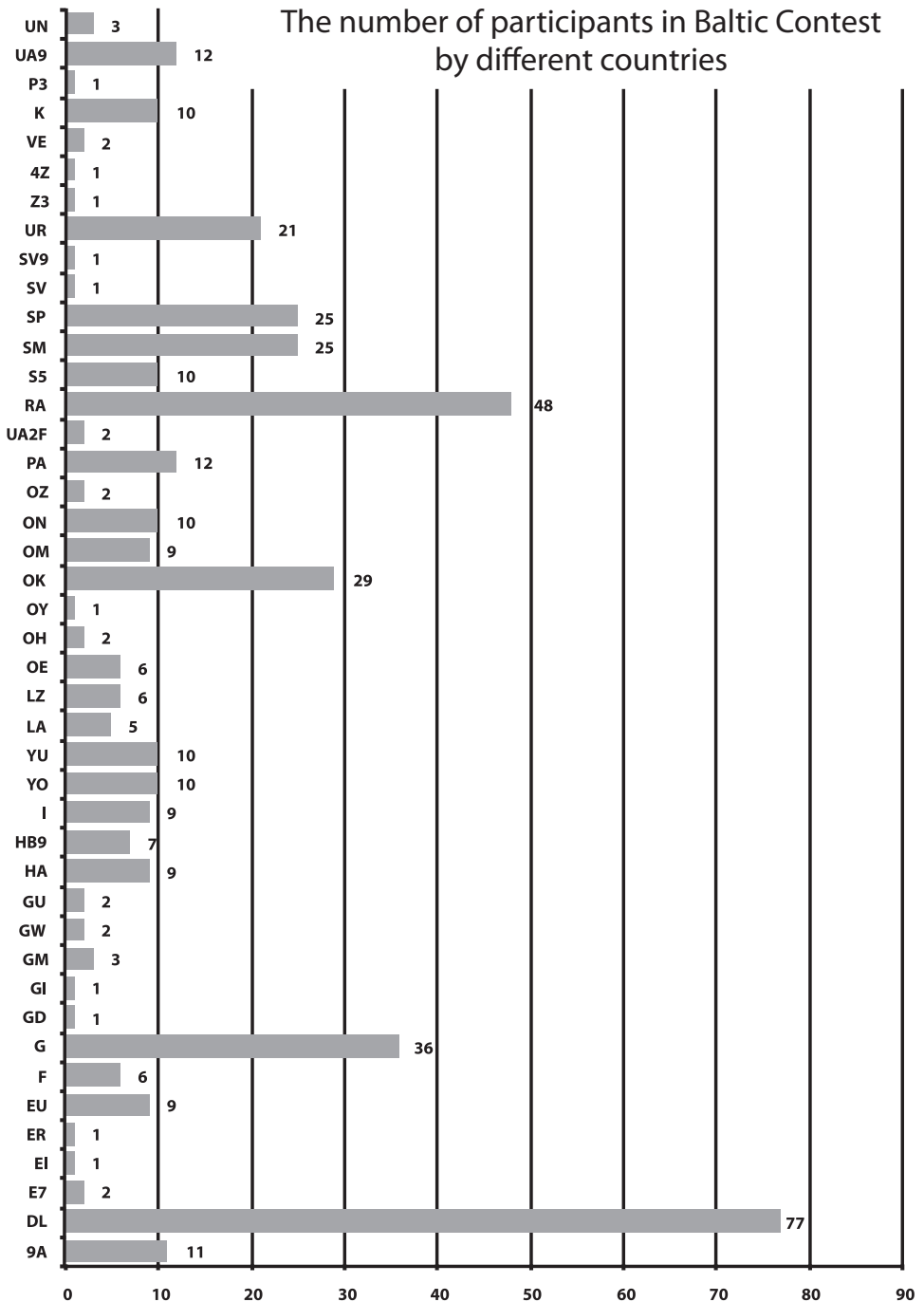

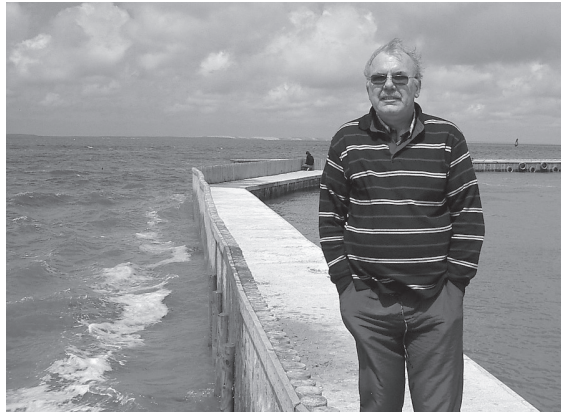

Bronius LY1CM. 3rd place SO CW (Baltic Countries).

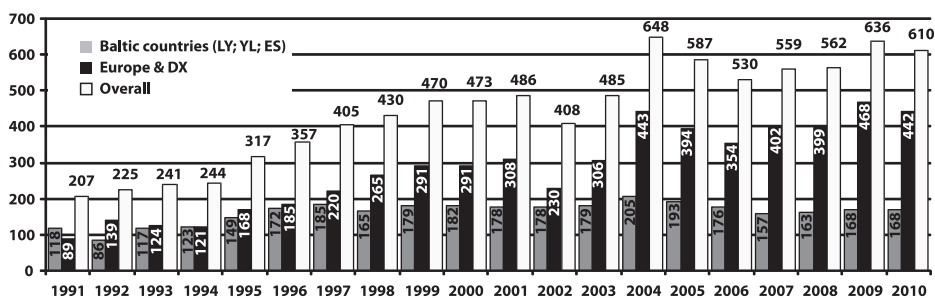


Vladimir RV1CC 3rd place SO CW (Baltic Countries)

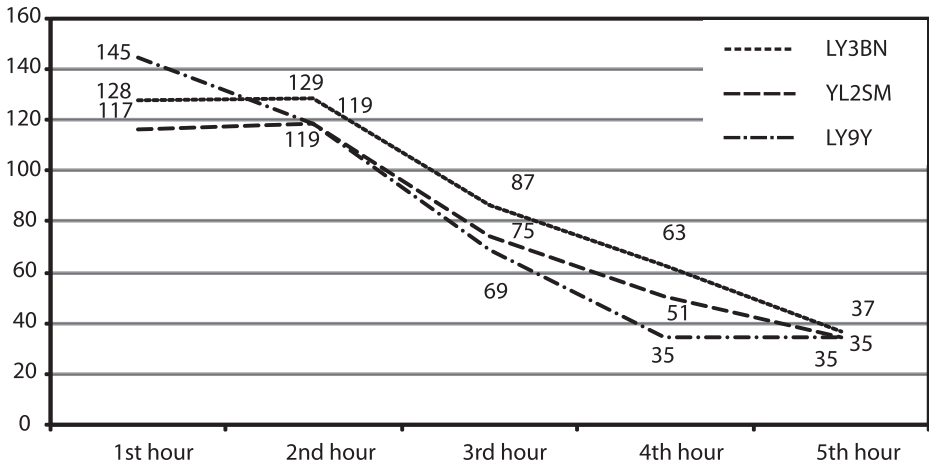

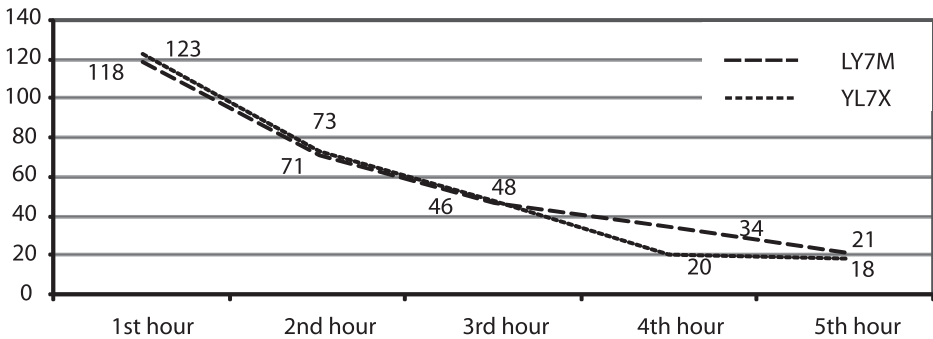
The number of participants in Baltic Contest



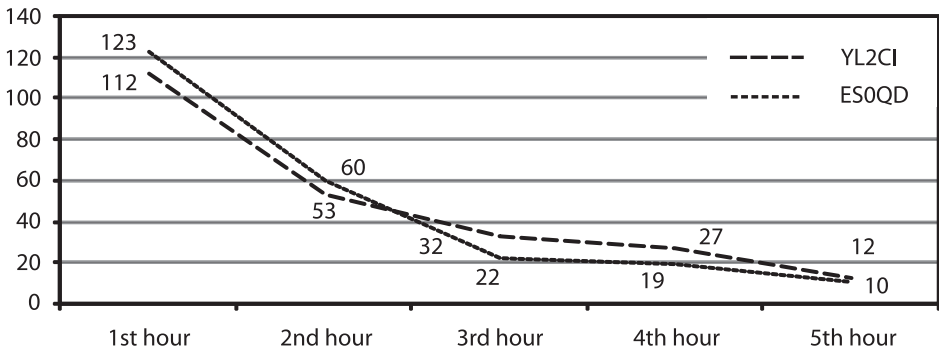
QSO rates of MIX mode leaders

The 47th BALTIC CONTEST 2011

General rules

The Lithuanian Radio Sports Federation has the honor to invite radio amateurs all over the world to enter 47th Baltic Contest 2011.

1. Aim of the BC: to promote radio sport in the Baltic countries and to expand relations between amateurs of the Baltic and the world.

2. The object of BC: to establish as many contacts as possible with amateur stations world wide.

3. Period: from 2100z May 21, 2011 till 0200z May 22, 2011.

4. Sections:

- A – single operator, CW/SSB
- B – single operator, CW
- C – single operator, SSB
- D – multi operator, single TX
- E – SWL

New!!! Use of spotting nets, packet, or multi-channel decoders (such as CWSkimmer) is not permitted. Single-operator stations that use spottingnets, packet or multi-channel decoders will be reclassified to the Multi-operator, Single Transmitter category.

5. Frequencies: CW (3510-3600) kHz, SSB (3600-3650 and 3700-3750) kHz.

6. Contest call: CW – TEST BC, SSB – CQ Baltic Contest

7. Exchange: RS(T) and serial number starting from 001. Each station may be worked once in SSB and once in CW.

8. Scoring: for participants in Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania each QSO (SWL rppt) with Europe counts 1 point and QSO (SWL rppt) with another continent counts 2 points. For participants in Europe each QSO (SWL rppt) with Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania counts 10 points, each QSO with another participants counts 1point. For participants outside Europe each QSO (SWL rppt) with ES, YL, LY counts 20 points, each QSO with another participants counts 1 point. SWL rppt must contain both call signs and at least one of the control numbers.

9. Final score: the sum of QSO (SWL rppt) points (no multiplier, no duplicate QSO (SWL rppt)). When the number of points is equal, the criteria for priority are: for better percentage of QSO (SWL rppt) confirmation; for more DX QSO (SWL rppt).

10. Awards: certificates will be awarded to the leading stations of each section for every country (DXCC) in accordance with the number of participants. Winners in A, B, C, D, E sections in the Baltic countries (ES, LY, YL), in the Europe and outside Europe will receive trophies.

Each contact has to have correct time in GMT, frequency (or band), call, report with serial number sent, and report with serial number received. A log without all required information may be reclassified to checklog.
